MESSAGE FROM THE HEADTEACHER



I am delighted to again write to you in Insight, our school magazine that has been absent for so long. It is one more indication that we have returned to a much more normal situation after years of Covid adaptation and disruption to regular school life.

This year has been an eventful one. It began with us still facing the challenges and restrictions of Covid-19, endeavouring to meet the many needs of students (and staff) who had endured periods of lockdown and school closure, and addressing the proposals for the reformed summer examinations. Then, in very close succession, we faced a whole series of challenges.

There was the Covid vaccination programme in October, our Ofsted inspection in November, issues around the Omicron variant in December and then, at last, the ending of Covid restrictions in February. But even with the ending of restrictions it took a while for Highgate Wood School to get back to what it was. Indeed, it has only been in recent weeks that I have really felt that normal times have returned.

The proper return to normality probably began with our public exams in May. Of course, there have been adjustments and changes to exams because of the pandemic, but the feel of things was very much as they used to be: students were working hard, teachers were providing support, revision sessions were taking place and examinations were being conducted in the same way as ever.

The picture was similar with the wider life of the school. During the year our extra-curricular provision had been developing, including a long awaited return to Pendarren Activity Centre and a variety of theatre trips and other excursions. But it was again in May where things genuinely came back to normal. We had great successes with our DebateMate Teams, exciting events organised by the Learning Resource Centre, fantastic performances in a wide variety of sporting competitions and record participation on the Year 10 Duke of Edinburgh challenge.

Even more recently we have enjoyed the return of MADFest, a fantastic evening organised by the PSA. We had a brilliant line-up of talented performers nurtured and supported by our Music Department as well as a fantastic showcase of work from students in

Art and Design Technology. MADFest also allowed the Drama Department to bring us the first school production since 2019 – The Wiz.

MADFest and The Wiz was swiftly followed by two Celebration Evenings, for our Year 13s and then our Year 11s. It was wonderful to again celebrate their achievements as we have traditionally been able to, with Year 11s in particular marking their 5 years at Highgate Wood School at the magnificent Union Chapel in Islington. Next came Primary Transition Day when we welcomed our new cohort of children for the day, and their parents\carers for the evening — our first face-to-face Transition Day in 3 years. Then we had our Rewards Trips for Years 7, 8, 9, 10 and 12, and Sports Day on 8th July.

It seems we are now completely "back to normal". Indeed, we have even been able to stage a new event which we hope will grow to become one of those central features of our school calendar. Cultural Day on 15th July was a celebration of the rich diversity of cultures that make Highgate Wood School such a special and unique place.

None of these events could have taken place without the active participation and contribution of our students, the incredible hard work of our staff and often the additional support of our PSA.

You will be aware that we have had some significant changes in the Senior Leadership Team this year and I would like to say a particular thanks to them for their involvement in so many of the successes that we have enjoyed this school year. But my thanks also extends to the entire staff and student body, the PSA who contribute so significantly to our wider school life and to our Governing Body who have provided such invaluable support to me personally, as well as to the entire school.

In the following pages of Insight I do hope you get a sense of some of the things that we have achieved, and also a notion of what will be in store for the coming academic year.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all our families, and our wider community, for their consistent and valued support. I wish you all a very enjoyable summer break and look forward to writing to you again in the next issue of Insight.

MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR OF GOVERNORS

Ms Elizabeth Hess writes:

Greetings from the HWS governors on this sweltering summer day. It's wonderful to have Insight back. Even with children who long ago graduated from HWS, I'm still anxious to read Insight with its rich content and smile-inducing photos.

In addition to the usual business of being a governor (meetings, working groups, Ofsted preparation, policies and panels), these past two years have seen some big-picture strategic changes that will make us more responsive as governors and allow us to better support (and challenge) the school.

We have run several recruitment campaigns and as a result, have welcomed six new governors onto the board. They bring a wide array of skills and experience that will benefit the school, as well as help us better represent the diversity of our student community.

The governor page on our school website will soon be brought up to date and you will be able to learn more about all of us. We've had some feedback in recent months about not being visible enough, and this will be something we will tackle in the new school year.

Earlier this year we went through a fascinating process of refreshing our brand by reviewing our vision and mission. It was a great example of students, parents, staff and governors all working together and shows the emphasis the school has on consensus. The outcomes are statements that focus on the community aspect and inclusive nature of Highgate Wood School and ensure that everyone plays a role. This was a critical milestone for us and will support the future direction of the school.

The climate crisis and sustainability have been very much on our minds and the new Sustainability Working Group has been set up so that governors can support the school, working with staff and pupils, to help make the school more sustainable. The conclusions from a student survey with more than 400 respondents revealed that most students believe there should be more education about sustainability in the school; that the school is doing "averagely" on its sustainability efforts; and that students feel that plastic waste and litter are big issues.

From September, the canteen will not sell any plasticbottled water. One early tangible change that governors have made is that all governors' meetings are now assumed to be 'paper free' unless there are special requests for printed copies of documents.



There is a new Student Support Committee and it is already enabling us to better provide strategic oversight and support for the school regarding the wellbeing of our students. The committee's key areas of interest and responsibility are behaviour, SEND, EAL, child protection and safeguarding and student personal development and wellbeing.

No round-up of our school year would be complete without mentioning our exciting Ofsted visit last autumn. All six chairs of our committees attended (instead of the usual three). I, for one, couldn't have been more proud of the entire school community than I was listening to the feedback from the obviously-impressed lead inspector at the end of the day.

On behalf of our governors, I want to thank Patrick, our senior leadership team and all of our staff whose work over the past couple of challenging years has been nothing short of remarkable and inspiring. And special thanks to our outgoing business manager, Steve Hatch, for the massive amount of extra work he did behind the scenes during Covid and to Tristan Ashman who has kept everyone informed with clear and timely communications throughout the pandemic.

Not only is this my first Insight letter as chair of governors, but it will also be my last. My final term as governor comes to an end in December, so there will be an election for chair when school is back in September.

It's been an honour over the past decade to serve this great neighbourhood school as a governor...the best job there is.

HIGHGATE WOOD SCHOOL OFSTED

We had been overdue for a routine Ofsted inspection following our inspection in 2016, so it wasn't a complete surprise when we received "the call" in November. School inspections had been paused during the pandemic but we knew they had started to resume.

The inspection team arrived at the school on 17th November and were extremely thorough, looking carefully at our curriculum, and building their understanding of the experiences of our students in the classroom and also their wider experiences in school - including behaviour, personal development, safeguarding and support.

We felt that the Ofsted team very quickly obtained a very good grasp of student life at Highgate Wood School, the strength of our teachers and support staff, and the effectiveness of our school leadership.

Their final report, which is now available on the Ofsted website, confirmed that we continue to be a "GOOD" school where students thrive, achieve, succeed, and develop into good citizens.

We are particularly pleased by the many positive comments that their final report contained, some of which are included below.

OPTION FOR FINGERPRINT ID

In 2018 we introduced fingerprint ID for those who wanted to use it. Many took up the offer. It is a simple and entirely secure system and proved very popular with students.





We withdrew the facility during the pandemic but are now able to reintroduce it. We will again ask permission from parents\carers and the students before they have their fingerprints scanned and will be sending families more information about this towards the end of the summer holidays. Please note that it is your choice whether to use the biometric\fingerprint system. It will remain possible for ID cards to be used for canteen purchases.

Please also be aware that we now use SCOPAY for online payments. Towards the end of the holidays we will be issuing login details to those families who have not yet used it so you are able to "top up" your child's account from home.

Mr Ashman writes:

On-line challenges have become very popular with young people. Some, like the #10yearchallenge, the Mannequin Challenge and the No Makeup Selfie, can be fun and are used to raise funds or awareness from good causes. But many others are not, and can be hurtful and even dangerous.

Recently there has been crazes from ripping clothes, getting sunburns and clambering on top of milk crates, all of which can lead to upset and potential injury.

If families are able to discuss the issues and risks of these social media challenges with their children and reinforce the school's messages around on-line safety it would be hugely appreciated.



Keilly Swift, Managing Editor of First News and Nic Smallshaw, their Head of Education, visited HWS to teach our students about the skills involved in creating a newspaper.

Our students were then given the exciting challenge of being the editors and journalists to write the First News Books page about Biblio-Buzz 2022 to appear in the paper in June.







Ms Ereira writes:

Author Ewa Jozefkowicz was our first in-person LRC visitor since 2020 so her first visit earlier this year was a particularly special event.

Ewa's first book, *The Mystery of the Colour Thief*, was shortlisted for the Waterstones Children's Book Prize. *The Cooking Club Detectives*, published in June 2021, is a big-hearted story about friendship and courage which tackles the subject of food poverty.

Her inspiration for *The Cooking Club Detectives* came from a school breakfast club which she helped to run. The book is about four children from very different backgrounds, brought together by their mutual love of food.

During that first visit Ewa talked to the students about her own life and influences, and gave some great advice to our aspiring writers.

Ewa returned to Highgate Wood School after the publication of her latest book, *The Dragon in the Bookshop*, on Thursday 7th July. We were the very first school she visited to talk about it.



This book is a new departure into fantasy for Ewa, drawing on the legends of her Polish heritage. Ewa told us the story of the Dragon of Krakow, which devoured people and cattle until it was defeated. Having heard the tale throughout her childhood, she had always wondered what had brought the dragon to Krakow in the first place and this was the spark which led to *The Dragon in the Bookshop*. Ewa talked to our Year 7 classes about her journey to becoming a published writer and provided a writing workshop for the students. She challenged them to write the opening of a story inspired by a legend, with copies of her book to be won. It's always wonderful to see how creative our students are!

WORLD BOOK DAY Ms Ereira writes: You've heard of The Masked Singer...

well this year eight brave members of HWS staff agreed to dress up in a bizarre assortment of disguises for our very own Masked Reader videos. In a series of three videos shown in the days leading up to World Book Day, our readers read excerpts from a selection of great books. JK ROWLING AT ALEXANDRA PALACE

In October, a lucky group of Year 7 students were treated to front stalls seats in the Alexandra Palace Theatre for the launch of JK Rowling's book, *The Christmas Pig.* We felt very privileged, having been offered this opportunity through our school library's connection with BiblioBuzz and the Alexandra Palace Children's Book Award.

The event was hosted by Konnie Huq, and JK Rowling was joined on stage by illustrator Jim Field and by Rocco Padden who plays the main character in the Audible version of *The Christmas Pig*.

JK Rowling read from the book and talked about her inspirations for the story, before the audience were invited to participate in a draw-along with Jim Field. Finally everyone was given the opportunity to have their books signed by JK Rowling.

Our students said that it was 'very exciting', 'amazing to be there', that they 'couldn't believe how close we all were to the stage', and that 'growing up reading her books it was really exciting to finally get the chance to meet her.' They loved being in the beautiful old theatre, too, which they found 'a breath-taking experience.'

Ms Ereira writes:


It was such a pleasure to see students back in the LRC discussing the shortlisted books and casting their votes this year.

In October, our book club created an incredible shortlist. It ranged across thrillers addressing different forms of racism, speculative dystopian stories addressing both gender and climate issues, sci-fi adventures, mysteries, and even a tale told through a blend of text and manga panels.





Students experienced a range of Post 16 lessons and took away the summer holiday Transition booklets to work through.





Ms Shepherd writes:


After a year of working away from our generous art rooms, this year our year 8 students have thrived again by making art using our amazing facilities, in particular our printing press and kiln.




