Dear Parents/Carers,

I hope that this letter finds you well. Isn't it scary how quickly we progress through the year? Apologies for this as I know that these concerns will not apply to the overwhelming majority of our student population (who represent themselves and the school wonderfully), but I must address them nonetheless.

Park Road Leisure Centre – A Letter of Concern

If you are a parent who comes to collect your child from school in the afternoon from Park Road, the communication below that we received from Fusion Lifestyle who run the Park Road Leisure Centre may apply to you.

Dear Mr Cozier,

Please can you do something to prevent the daily idling vehicles in Park Road Leisure Centre Car Park awaiting pupil pickup. This goes on for up to half an hour each afternoon from about 14:30.

This is not just immoral but illegal too. Vehicle idling is an offence against the Road Traffic (Vehicle Emissions) (Fixed Penalty) (England) Regulations 2002. The law states that is an offence to idle your engine unnecessarily when stationary. If you fail to turn your engine off after being spoken to you may be issued with a fixed penalty notice.

The school should be at the forefront of issues to tackle air pollution and climate change.

Lime Bikes

Continuing with the theme of being considerate to our neighbours, we have recently received a complaint from our neighbours on Montenotte Road and Glasslyn Road in relation to the proliferation of Lime Bikes being parked in random and inconvenient places on the road. The specific concern states...

'We would all appreciate it if your pupils could be taught some etiquette regarding these bikes. They should know that it is not acceptable to block the pavements or property entrance gates. Nor should they be left in positions where they may damage cars or fences.'

We will also be speaking to the students about this, but if you know that your child does use these bikes, we would be very grateful if you could have a conversation about this issue.

W5 Bus Stop in The Mornings

We have had some concerns raised by a local person who uses the W5 bus service from Crouch End in the mornings. Her complaint refers to some of our students pushing to the front of the queue and showing a lack of consideration for other users of the service.

There are two issues for us to address as a school. The first one is to remind our students who use the bus to be aware of other members of the public attempting to get onto the bus. We always encourage them to let members of the public onto the buses first. The other issue for us is to discourage our students from using the bus service at all. The walk from Crouch End to the school should be very manageable for our young, fit and healthy students and we would encourage them to walk.

Knocking on Doors of Local Residents

Lastly, on the issue of maintaining our relationships with our local residents – there are a small number of children who are knocking on the doors of local residents and then running away. I have no doubt that these students are regarding this as a game of fun, but unfortunately the impact on some of our residents (particularly those who are elderly or have young children) has been upsetting. I reminded the students about our expectations in the whole school assembly on Friday – but it would also be helpful if you could reinforce this with your children as well.

Tassomai – A Plea from Mr Nayar

"If you have already contributed, thank you very much, especially to those that have, without asking, contributed extra!

As you are aware, we use Tassomai as our main science homework for all KS3 and KS4 students – you should all be receiving weekly emails asking you to log in and view your child's progress. Prior to lockdown, we used it for GCSE students only, with a small cost requested from parent/carers. As we found Tassomai to be so useful we extended it to KS3 and funded it during the pandemic.

As the financial situation of schools has changed, we would like to request that all parents/carers please contribute £6 per year towards the cost of Tassomai. Some of you have noticed that it has appeared on Scopay (our online payment platform) and it is through this that we kindly request that payment is made.

We have managed to negotiate a substantial discount for the school - as a private subscriber, Tassomai would cost either £29.99 or £44.99 per month, depending on school year.

Why do we use Tassomai?

It is based on the educational principles of spacing, interleaving and targeted repetition to help students improve their grades. It works by spreading their learning into bite-sized chunks over as long a period of time as possible. This reduces anxiety in students as revision is 'little and often' and does not leave students with a huge amount of revision before assessments. As students answer questions the algorithm begins to learn where their strengths and weaknesses are, allowing the site to target specific gaps in their knowledge - but also making it easier for our teachers to see where your child might need some extra help.

It is used in over 500 school and has a proven impact on GCSE grades. Students that regularly complete their Weekly Goal succeed in meeting or exceeding their Minimum Expected Grades (MEGs). In our experience, students that regularly complete Tassomai perform very well in GCSEs and are much more confident in the classroom.

Free School Meal (FSM) Vouchers at Easter

We have recently received some news from Haringey Council regarding the provision of FSM vouchers at Easter for those families who are eligible. Unfortunately, due to budget restraints Haringey will only be providing FSM vouchers for one of the weeks at Easter. The voucher will be worth £15 per child for the week.

The Council has expressed regret that they have decided to not continue the vouchers in the new financial year so will not be providing them for the second week of Easter or any further holidays. The Council faces many challenges with setting a balanced budget for next year and has had to make some very hard choices to make savings.

If your family is impacted by this decision and this causes you significant difficulty, please contact your child's Head of Year to inform us so that we can discuss ways in which we can support you.

Supporting Great Attendance

I am sure that you would all agree with me that high attendance is critically important in helping children progress in their learning. We are doing well at HWS and our attendance figures are considerable better than the national averages. However, it remains a priority for the school and for the whole of the UK. It has been a major focus for the Department for Education (DFE) and for Ofsted, particularly since COVID.


